KIWANIS MISSION

KIWANIS SERVICE

Service is at the heart of every Kiwanis club, no matter where in the world it's located. Members stage approximately 150,000 service projects and raise nearly US\$100 million every year for communities, families and projects. By working together, members achieve what one person cannot accomplish alone.

KIWANIS OF MONROE

Kiwanis Club of Monroe, Michigan, is the 52nd club started on August 31, 1934, and was sponsored by Detroit Kiwanis Club Number 1 (the first Kiwanis Club in the world). The Charter was presented by Joseph C. Prance on October 24, 1934 with a charter membership of 27. The first President was Joseph A. Navarre Jr., and the first Secretary was Francis Reddy.

Club meetings are held once a week, on Wednesdays at noon, and offer an atmosphere of fun, learning, fellowship and lunch. Meetings are at St Paul's United Methodist Church, 201 S Monroe St, Monroe, MI 48161

In addition, every Kiwanian volunteers to assist with club service projects at least once a quarter.

Members pay an annual fee and are billed quarterly for their lunch, irrespective of whether they attend or not.

Service projects often are linked to the Kiwanis program, “Young Children: Priority One” and also address other needs within the community such as Special Olympics.
